

## THE MISSION OF FIRST STEP

is to reduce the incidence of domestic and sexual violence and to provide services to individuals affected by these crimes. Prevention of domestic and sexual violence through education, advocacy and appropriate intervention is the ultimate goal of First Step.

The work of First Step is based on the belief that domestic and sexual violence are damaging to those individuals directly involved and to society as a whole. It is criminal conduct which cannot be tolerated. All individuals shall be provided safety and must be treated with dignity and respect. Support shall focus on self-determination and empowerment. Diversity shall also be honored. Interventions that blame the survivor and do not hold the offender accountable for the battering and rape are ineffective and inappropriate.



### PHILOSOPHY STATEMENT

FIRST STEP believes that everyone has the right to live and work in a safe environment.
FIRST STEP believes that no one deserves to be victimized by assaultive and coercive behavior.
FIRST STEP defines violence and assaultive behavior as intentional acts used to gain power and control over others including physical, emotional, and psychological abuse and is not isolated incidents, but rather a pattern of behaviors.
FIRST STEP sees all people involved in these violent crimes as affected: the victims, offenders, children, their families and friends. FIRST STEP believes that it is important not to overlook the damaging effects of violence on children.
FIRST STEP believes that we each must play a role in a coordinated community response to the issues of domestic and sexual violence.
FIRST STEP provides comprehensive services for individuals and families impacted by domestic and sexual violence.
FIRST STEP is a place where survivors can think and make decisions in a non-coercive environment.
FIRST STEP recognizes that the process of making changes and/or adjusting to traumas is very difficult.

FIRST STEP recognizes that it is often very difficult to seek help for personal problems like domestic violence or sexual assault. FIRST STEP understands that people stay in violent relationships for varied and complex reasons.
